Solar Panels from New Energy Equity

CRAB hosted New Energy Equity President Matt Hankey and Kevin Corcoran, Sr. Project Manager, at the Annapolis Adaptive Boating Center (ABC) in late February. The visit allowed Kevin and Matt to see the excellent work done by their contractor that installed 72 solar panels to the ABC raised-seam metal roof. The solar panels will provide all of the power required at the ABC for the next 25 years.

The power provider agreement signed by CRAB and NEE honors Ian Palmer, CRAB Treasurer (2015-17) and founder of NEE. NEE will own the Renewable Energy Credits (REC's). The solar power returned to the grid will be more than CRAB's daily electric load. The project size was limited to 200% of the power requirement of the building; otherwise, the remaining open space on the roof could have supported additional solar panels and clean energy for the grid.

CRAB is especially thankful to New Energy Equity for their generous contribution to the sustainability of the Adaptive Boating Center and the reduction of future operating expenses. The electricity savings will create an opportunity for CRAB to allocate more resources toward providing adaptive water experiences and improving access to the Chesapeake Bay at no cost to our guests!

Powerboating comes to CRAB



With a grant from the Meridian Foundation, CRAB has purchased a Gemini Freestyle 399 Catamaran named "Dream Catcher" that will be used by guests in wheelchairs (who do not want to leave their chairs) or any disability to go fishing or cruising on the Bay. The boat has been delivered, and CRAB is working with boat vendors to customize the boat with adaptative modifications so people using wheelchairs can safely board, stay secure while underway, and disembark.

The new adaptive catamaran will allow up to five guests, plus family members or friends, the opportunity to learn powerboating skills and earn a Maryland Boating Certificate. Additional recreational activities may include crabbing or wakeboarding in the future.

The Gemini provides a new opportunity for our guests in wheelchairs to enjoy the beautiful Chesapeake Bay. The boat has over 140 sq. ft. of open floor space that is completely covered by a hardtop with a sunroof for protection from the sun or inclement weather.

The ability to offer an alternative to sailing is expected to make CRAB an even more attractive destination for guests with disabilities who desire to be on the water. Regardless of the weather, the Gemini Freestyle will be able to accommodate guests comfortably and safely!

Adaptive Boating Center Update!









The CRAB Annapolis Adaptive Boating Center (ABC) is coming close to completion. By next week we expect to have the building inspections completed and a Use & Occupancy permit in hand. Every contractor is working exceptionally hard to meet the opening. The most impressive accomplishment, from an artistic perspective, is the Cindy Holden Fletcher 50' x 6' mural of a day at CRAB inside the Lawrence B. Taishoff Building. The first panel depicts a group of guests departing the dock with a Blue Heron flying past the 3 wheelchairs on the dock. Giving flight has a new meaning for CRAB guests, and you might recognize CRAB Past President Lance Hinrichs in the boat.

The second panel shows several CRAB sailboats on a close reach with the new Gemini catamaran in the background with the City of Annapolis on the opposite shore. The panoramic view includes the major landmarks in and around the City (a little artistic license). The sun on the far right contains words that actually have been said to CRAB volunteers during and after their sailing adventures. The CRAB chase boat is coming into the scene as well.

The third and final panel depicts a CRAB sailboat at dusk being sailed by CRAB founder Don Backe. Don passed away in April 2013, and the ABC will be opening on the 10th anniversary of his passing. The panel also contains some words from guests that bring real meaning to the importance of what CRAB does.

We look forward to showing the ABC to our donors, volunteers, and guests during a variety of events meant to showcase the facility while not overcrowding the .86 acre campus.
